A Brief History

- WIC was established in 1972 by an act of Congress
- Very first WIC clinic in Pineville, Kentucky opened January, 1974
- First clinic in Ohio opened later that same month
- WIC was statewide in Ohio by 1984
- There are 74 projects in Ohio with clinics in all 88 counties



What is WIC

- Official name: Special Supplemental Nutrition
 Program for Women, Infants, and Children
- WIC is a preventive nutrition program
- WIC provides:
 - Nutrition education and counseling
 - Breastfeeding education and support
 - Supplemental foods
 - > Referral services



Who does WIC Serve

- Women
 - Who are pregnant
 - Who are breastfeeding
 - Who have an infant under 6 months of age
- Infants
 - > From birth to 12 months of age
- Children
 - > From 1 to 5 years of age



Eligibility

- Meet Income requirements
 - ➤ 185% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines (Ex: A family of 4 grossing up to \$3747 per month is incomeeligible)
 - Adjunctive eligibility
- Meet Residency requirements
 - Must live in the State in which they are applying for benefits
- Have a nutrition or medical risk
 - Determined by a Health Professional in the clinic

Certification Process

- Intake
- Lab
- Counseling
- Benefit/Card Issuance



Redemption of Benefits

- Benefits issued to WIC Nutrition Card (WNC)
- Specific to participant's nutritional needs
- WNCs can be used at more than 1400 authorized vendor locations
- Can only purchase items/quantities that have been issued to card
- Items must be contained in State-approved
 UPC database
